Title Abstract Video	A Livelihood from Waste This film looks at a recycling initiative in Mukuru, a slum on the outskirts of Nairobi, Kenya, where a group of former scavengers have formed the Mukuru Recycling Centre. The scavengers collect waste, separate it, sell it to the private sector and produce white briquettes as charcoal and compost. The film also shows how UNCHS (Habitat) has been able to support the Centre with technical assistance and training.

In fact tourist brochures would have us believe that life on small island states is idyllic. Yet life on this so called paradise is precarious. This programme looks at the lives of ordinary families and describes the deteriorating urban environment in Chennai (India), Dar-es-Salaam (Tanzania), Katowice (Poland) and Shenyang (China). The programme also shows how the UNCHS/UNEP Sustainable Cities Programme is helping improve the urban environment.
