Information Note by the Executive Director

Summary

This document provides further elaboration of the proposed work programme of UNCHS (Habitat) for the biennium 2002-2003, by showing, in a logical framework format, the linkages between subprogramme objectives, activities, outputs, actors and resources. Part A consists of three logical frameworks, one for each of the two subprogrammes and a third for executive direction and programme support functions. For each objective, the following aspects are shown: related activities, outputs and services resulting from each activity and actors or key organizational units (branches) responsible for implementation. Part B shows the responsibilities of each of the Centre's substantive branches for implementation of subprogramme objectives, including the related activities and outputs. This part also shows the optimal human resources required by each branch of the Centre to implement the described subprogramme responsibilities.
