Establish a Vision for Training Institutes and Capacity Building

What is a Vision?

• A written statement expressing the collective view and goals of leaders, and other stakeholders about the kind of status they would like to achieve within a set time.

Example of a Vision


"To be a Center of Excellence in capacity building for local self-governance".

The viability of achieving the Vision? Consider the Strengths and Weaknesses of the training institute, the Opportunities it has to become a center of excellence, and the Threats to those opportunities.




Internal and External Forces

• Strengths and Weaknesses are attributes that characterize internal qualities of the institute.



•Opportunities and Threats are attributes that affect the institute from its external environment.





Positive Internal factors (Strengths) might include:

- Resources: people, expertise. assets, history, management structure
- The present status or image of the institute
- The financial strength of the institute and the level of autonomous funding

Negative Internal Factors (Weaknesses) might include;

- Dependency on central government funds for program offerings
- Weak human resource capacity
- Insufficient resources
- Lack of buildings and facilities

Positive External factors (Opportunities) might include :

- High demand for professional training from local government units
- Favorable policies of the central government for decentralized governance

Negative External (Threats) factors might include :

- Competition between institutions in the region for offering training courses
- Difficulty of local governments to release their staff for long-term training programs

Application of SWOT Analysis

• SWOT analysis provides information that is helpful in **matching the resources and capabilities** to achieve the 'vision'.

- It is also **helpful in strategy formulation and selection**.
- Remember that, SWOT Analysis is a technique to check the viability of an idea (VISION).

External Opportunities	S-O Strategies Pursue opportunities that are good fit to the Institute's Strengths	W-O Strategies Overcome weaknesses to pursue opportunities
External Threats	S-T Strategies Identify the ways for the institute to overcome its vulnerability to external threats	W-T Strategies Establish a defensive plan to prevent the institute's weaknesses from making it susceptible to threats
